I am the Analyst for the City of Liverpool.

On the 26th January last I received certain articles from witness Gold. They are produced as follows:-

W.H.W. 10. Mackintosh.

20. Piece of hair.

20. Two pictures.

27. Two photographs.

28. A violin in case.

29. Piece of music.

30. A cushion.

The outside of the violin case W.H.W. 28 had been stained with

blood on the right side and the right cuff had also been stained with

31. A hearthrug.

32. A cash box.

33. A collar bill.

One end of the collar bill W.H.W. 33 was stained with

34. Piece of carpet.

35. A towel.

36. Lock and key.

37. Women's skirt.

On the 26th January last I was handed by witness Gold the four £1 notes, a postal order for 2/4 and a half crown. These are produced W.H.W. 27.

I examined all these articles.

The mackintosh W.H.W. 10 was extensively and heavily stained with human blood on the right side both inside and outside and on the upper inner side of the right sleeve. The outside of the left cuff and a large area near the left pocket was similarly stained. A considerable portion of the bottom right side had been recently burnt away.

I visited the house 29, Wolverton Street on the 21st January last. On the floor of the sitting room near and on the hearthrug I found many small fragments of the burnt mackintosh. I

found no fragments anywhere else in the house. In my opinion the meekintosh had been burnt in the sitting room on the previous evening. The meekintosh was so pliable at the burnt portion that on being shaken fragments dropped off.

The piece of hair N.N.N.20 was melted together with several human blood clots.

The pictures N.N.N.20 were both spattered from all angles with human blood.

One of the photographs N.N.N.27 had four human blood splashes on it. The other had a human blood smear on the bottom right hand side of the glass.

The outside of the violin case N.N.N.28 had many human blood stains on one side, together with particles of the human meekintosh. [L. East] No answer.

One corner of the hearthrug N.N.N.31 was soaked with human blood, there being also numerous small human spots on other parts. The blood had not soaked right through the hearthrug.

The cash box N.N.N.20 and the dollar bill N.N.N.32 were free from blood.

The suit of clothes N.N.N.33 was free from blood stains with the exception of two minute old stains in the right hand trousers pocket.

The carpet N.N.N.34, the towel N.N.N.35 and the lock and key N.N.N.32 were all free from blood.

The front of the skirt N.N.N.36 was heavily stained with human blood. At the bottom of the placket there were three recent horizontal burns which could have been caused by contact with the hot fire-clay of a gas fire such as the one in the sitting room of 29, Wolverton Street.

The four £1 notes N.N.N.37 were numbered as follows:-

The front of the outside brown leather cover of the music
N.Y.W. 29 was splattered with human blood.

On the cushion N.Y.W. 30 there were numerous
small human blood stains on one side together with
particles of the burnt material.

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These notes had been folded into four and when opened the one No. G.56 593125 was on top. On the front of this note extending from the "0" in "one" diagonally upwards were several human blood smears, such as would be caused by drawing a slightly blood stained thumb across the note. These smears were of recent origin and were consistent with them having been made on 20th January last but it is impossible to state definitely the exact age. The remaining notes, the postal order and the half crown were free from blood.

From the blood I saw in the sitting room and on the articles to which I have referred I should say in quantity there would be about one pint.

By Mr. SCHOLFIELD ALLEN, Counsel for accused:-

It might have been 1½ pints but no more.

The tests I carried out with regard to the blood were five in number and are set out on the typed document produced W.H.W.38.

The blood on the £1 note was perfectly dry when I saw it. The blood stain on it might have been two days before the 20th January last but not three, but it is more consistent with it having been made on the 20th January. I arrived at this conclusion by staining and examining other notes.

I did not measure the length of the mackintosh W.H.W.18.

The two old stains in the trousers pocket had been made some time before the 20th January last and had nothing to do with this case.
